

The HOME Network (THN) is a national initiative that brings together a solution-focused group of home dialysis healthcare professionals from across Australia & New Zealand (ANZ). The group draws upon all levels of evidence to provide insights and practical options for colleagues throughout ANZ to facilitate a positive change towards increased uptake of home dialysis.

Since its establishment in 2009, THN has had considerable successes in developing resources for patients and healthcare professionals in line with its objectives and making optimal use of members' time available to commit to projects.

The vision and mission of THN is to identify solutions and strategies to promote and enhance home dialysis. Our members are committed to driving outcomes aligned with the group's strategy and working towards achieving our overall mission statement, which is: "Through research, education and advocacy, The HOME Network aims to enable healthcare professionals with knowledge and resources to empower more people with chronic kidney disease to embrace the freedom of home dialysis".

The HOME Network has been working within three focus areas:

The First Nations Australia Kidney Guidelines Launch

The Caring for Australians and New Zealanders with Kidney Impairment (CARI) Guidelines is the Australia and New Zealand guideline developer in nephrology, supported by the Australia and New Zealand Society of Nephrology and the peak consumer body, Kidney Health Australia. CARI develops guidelines focused on the clinical management of patients with chronic kidney disease.

In October 2022, the new CARI Clinical Guidelines for culturally-safe kidney care for First Nations Australians Guidelines were launched. It consists of the following documents:

- ~ 103 pages full document
- ~ 23 pages Executive Summary
- ~ 9 pages of Main Recommendations
- ~ 2 pages Consumer Summary

The full document summarises the recommendations for culturally-safe and clinical kidney care for First Nations Australians, and includes the historical context for the Guidelines and a set of Guidelines:

- (1) Culturally-safe and responsive kidney health care;
- (2) Screening, and referral of chronic kidney disease;
- (3) Public awareness, education, and self-management; and
- (4) Models of care.

The Flow & Thrive artwork within the documents represents the landscape of living with a kidney condition.

What's happening in the Allied Health Engagement **Strategic Direction Focus?**


One of our new strategic directions this year focuses on "Allied Health Engagement". A fresh direction where we will explore how allied health approaches can strengthen home dialysis utilisation.

Access to Allied Health




The THN Allied Health members met in February to explore the idea of developing a video-based education tool and information sheet, engagement, ways to distribute the education tool, how this will fit into the bigger plan for THN, and, discussing a pilot study to determine the efficacy of this intervention in driving improved uptake of allied health services and its potential to impact on utilisation of home dialysis therapies.


